The Sunshine State Young Readers Award (SSYRA) book list is developed each year utilizing input from experienced committees of media specialists from throughout Florida. The books on this list may not be appropriate for all students. Some books may include main characters navigating mature teen and/or adult situations. Stories represent various genres, formats, reading levels, viewpoints, and ethnic/cultural perspectives, while exploring sensitive issues. Therefore, it is imperative that concerned parents/guardians play an active role in their child's reading selection by previewing the titles to ensure an enriching and exciting reading experience.

The SSYRA books are used for our Battle of the Books (BotB). Battle of the Books is a school and district-based competition used to promote the love of reading amongst students and encourage students to read widely from the list of Sunshine State Young Reader books. At FCMS, we have three battles. Each battle includes five of the fifteen SSYRA titles. (If there are five members on a team, each member has to read one book!) The questions asked at each battle are about the details of the five different stories. All of the answers to the questions are the titles of the five books. The team accumulating the most points from all three battles will be our winner and will represent FCMS at the SJCSD Middle School Battle of the Books in January 2020.

Students do not have to participate in Battle of the Books to read the SSYRA books. Please preview the attached annotated list of this year's books. Sign up for Battle of the Books will begin September 3. Any student wishing to participate must have a signed permission slip turned in by September 18. Permission slips will be handed to the students when they sign up in the media center.

Building Security

Parents: In a continuing effort to provide safety and security to our students and staff we ask that you complete a School Access Form if you plan to enter a facility in the St. Johns County School District. The link for the School Access Form and related information can be found on the FCMS homepage or at: https://www.stjohns.k12.fl.us/volunteer/. This includes if you would like to meet with a guidance counselor, teacher, or volunteer for special activities such as the book fair, field trips, school dances or other activities.

Any person going beyond the front office area of a school must have a completed school access form, and present a valid driver's license or state identification card when signing into a school. To check your status, contact the school which you wish to enter two weeks after completion of the school access form. It is suggested that the form be completed right away, as it can take two to six weeks to process. Once school access has been granted, a person signs into the school as a volunteer, and chooses the activity that best describes what he/she will be doing in the school. Driver's license and state identification card are required upon each sign in.

But man can't survive on Twinkies alone. A life-threatening adventure such as this requires the companionship of the dirt bike-riding new girl in town and Gus's two former friends. Throughout the day and night, the group of outsiders learn that they have more things in common than they realized, and it's their newly formed bond that will be the key to their survival. 

Thoughts from the Guidance Team



Media and Your Child

Our children's connection to media is everywhere, coming from more sources and more screens than we probably remember when we were kids: TV, movies, video games, handheld games, computers, cell phones, ipads, ipods, watches, etc. There are many wonderful uses for media that provide conveniences and education for us and our families. There are also dangers in media that as parents and educators, we are tasked to protect children from. With all the amazing advances in technology, we cannot forget to make advances in how we protect children from media that is not age- appropriate.

It's important to remember that children's brains are not fully developed, specifically the part of the brain (pre-frontal cortex) responsible for critical thinking, judgement, problem-solving, and impulse control. When a child or adolescent views media showing violence, sexual content, or harmful stereotypes, their own ideas, feelings, and behaviors are impacted. Without some guidance from a trusted grown-up, repeated exposure to these kinds of media may lead to an increase in aggression and a decrease in empathy.

Quick tips for setting media guidelines:

- Limit the amount of screen time to 1-2 hours a day (or less if you notice it is negatively impacting your child).
- Model screen-free times/activities (like dinner time, for example).
- Keep children's bedrooms free of screen media (no TV, game systems, laptops, I-pads, cell phones, etc).
- Preview media that your child is interested in before you allow them to view/play it.
- Co-view media (if appropriate) with your child and discuss the content this will help them develop critical thinking skills.
- Do your research about social media websites (like Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram) and closely monitor usage. Remember, these sites are typically for ages 13 and up.
- Stick to rating recommendations. They exist for a reason.
- Use your parental judgement. Your children are counting on you to set limits!
